Dear Mayor McKenzie,

Please find the quarterly Community Policing Report attached that covers the April 1<sup>st</sup> to June 30<sup>th</sup>, 2023 reporting period. The attached report outlines a quarterly snapshot of the human resources, financial data and crime statistics for Barrhead Detachment.

As part of the Alberta RCMP's ongoing priority to ensure public safety, encouraging citizens to report all crimes plays a vital role in building community well-being. We recognize that nonurgent crimes such as minor thefts and property crime may go unreported due to various reasons such as perceived insignificance or fear of inconvenience. Thus, the Alberta RCMP continues to engage citizens on the importance of reporting non-urgent crimes to help us optimize our crime prevention efforts.

To help facilitate this, we have made reporting of non-urgent crime easier through the Alberta RCMP APP (available as a free download on the <u>Apple App Store</u> or <u>Google Play</u>). Online crime reporting offers a convenient way for citizens to report non-emergent crime to Alberta RCMP from their computer or smartphone without having to phone or visit the police detachment.

An informed community is a safer community. Here are some reasons why online reporting of non-urgent crimes matters:

- Alberta RCMP police officers in the Call Back Unit are responsible for investigating online crime reports, thus reducing the need for frontline police officers to respond. Encouraging the public to use online crime reporting gives the Detachment frontline officers an opportunity to spend more of their time for proactive policing activities in the community.
- Non-urgent online crime reporting also has the potential to reduce those same nonurgent phone calls to our 911 Operators (OCCS) and Detachment Staff.



 The Alberta RCMP encourages citizens to report every crime to allow us to leverage reliable data to identify patterns and trends in criminal activities in our communities. We also use this intelligence to distribute our resources strategically and ensure that our police officers are deployed where they are most needed.

Thank you for your ongoing support and continued guidance in ensuring that we are consistently meeting your community's evolving policing needs. As the Chief of Police for your community, I invite you to contact me should you have any questions or concerns.

Priority 1	Reduce Substance Abuse
Current Status & Results	No new trafficking or PPT files were generated this quarter. This is largely due to the three most prolific dealers being in jail awaiting trial. The unit continues to work developing intelligence and identifying new players.
Priority 2	Enhance Awaress and Education

#### Trends/Points of Interest

Criminal Code files are up substantially. Drivers include Theft Under \$5000 (71 vs. 24 last year) and Utter Threats (11 vs. 6 last year). Total Criminal Code is the highest we've seen in the past five years. Drug enforcement is down substantially. In part this is because our most active dealers are all in jail. Increased Criminal Code activity also leaves less time for self generated work including drug activity. This is also reflected in our traffic stats which went from 566 to 197. Collisions have increased. The primary causal factor remains animal strikes.

The Crime Severity Indexes for 2022 have been released. Alberta's CSI is 103.2. Barrhead's went up from 88.3 to 92.5. This places us 85th of 148 RCMP jurisdictions and well below the Provincial average.


#### Comments

Police Officers: Of the 10 established positions, seven officers are working with one on special leave (one Parental leave) and there are two hard vacancies detected at this time. A backfill has been identified for one of these vacancies and he is in the transfer process.

Detachment Support: Of the three established positions, three resources are working. There is no vacancy detected at this time.

The unit is dealing with staffing shortages as have only four General Duty constables working instead of seven. We have a lateral transfer coming and he hopes to be here for September. We will also get a member back from Pat Leave in September so the shortage will ease up at the end of the summer. We are also pushing for a Cadet to fill the final vacancy but have heard nothing to date. Overtime members are being brought in to alleviate the work loads.

#### 1.0 PURPOSE:

To consider donating the 1998 Town owned Fire Truck Unit.

#### 2.0 BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

In 2020 the Town and County purchase a 2020 Fort Gary single axle unit (Unit # 37) to replace a Town owned 1998 unit, as seen below:





The unit has 27,800 mile and the unit was replaced as the unit reached its twenty years of service. Emergency apparatus that are 15 years or older will not meet the newer safety standards and requirements. Upgrading older apparatus to attempt to meet the newer standards is not a sound strategy due to significant cost and engineering restrictions of the older apparatus design. The risk of older apparatus used as front-line vehicles are not a safe practice due to the possibility of failure no matter how well they are maintained.

The original though was to convert the unit into a Community Events Vehicle to be use during the local Ag. Society Parade and other community events.

In lieu of the noted strategy, Council elected to allocate some funds to repair the 1933 single axle unit, currently stored in the museum into a community vehicle.



The breaks for the 1933 unit have now been repaired however, the master cylinder needs some attention as new bushings are required.

Should the unit be sold through a public auction, the anticipated sell price would be in the neighborhood of \$3,500.00.

We were told that these unit are typically purchased for parts.

# It All Started With A School Bus



# **Highway To Mexico**

In 2001, a Grande Prairie Rotary Club acquired a school bus to transport wheelchairs to needy people in Mazatlan, Mexico. Building on that success, the Highway to Mexico project was born in 2003 with the delivery of two more school buses leading up to the 117<sup>th</sup> vehicle being delivered in 2022 (our 21<sup>st</sup> year!).

The project started with school buses, but the need for emergency vehicles, equipment and training was evident in the State of Sinaloa and beyond, Even in cities over 500,000 people, the government does not provide funding for Fire Departments or Ambulance Services which are staffed mostly by volunteers. The equipment and training that the Highway to Mexico project has provided has been invaluable.

Each year, volunteer Rotarians drive 5,000 km to Mexico in a convoy of up to 12 fire trucks, ambulances and school buses. All of the equipment is donated to agencies which meet rigid standards for sustainability determined by Rotary Clubs in Mexico. The fuel, maintenance insurance, tolls fees and expenses are funded by Rotary.

# **Rotary Needs Your Support**

The Highway to Mexico project has been successful due to the generous donations received from various cities, towns, municipalities and companies who have provided new or retired fire apparatus, firefighting appliances, rescue tools, medical equipment and personal protective equipment. Purchasing all of this would not be possible. To date, the replacement value of all donated items delivered is approximately \$20,000,000.

The apparatus and equipment have a dramatic impact on responder and public safety in Mexico and are treated with respect by its recipients. Such appreciation and care will extend the service life of the equipment well into the future.

The real effect of the project is seen when the vehicles and equipment are delivered to communities in Mexico. It is truly life changing. A bus gets kids to school. Fire apparatus and wellequipped and protected firefighters save homes and businesses. #### 1.0 PURPOSE:

For Council to receive the Chief Administrative Officer's report on a petition regarding the decision of Council to reconstruct a portion of 53<sup>rd</sup> avenue, as information.

#### 2.0 BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION:

In accordance to the Municipal Government Act, the following are the general requirements for a petition to be considered valid:

#### Section 224(1)

A petition must consist of one or more pages, each of which must contain an identical statement of the purpose of the petition.

(2) The petition must include, for each petitioner,

(a) the printed surname and printed given names or initials of the petitioner,(b) the petitioner's signature,

(c) the street address of the petitioner or the legal description of the land on which the petitioner lives,

- (c.1) the petitioner's telephone number or e-mail address, if any, and
- (d) the date on which the petitioner signs the petition.
- (3) Each signature must be witnessed by an adult person who must
  - (a) sign opposite the signature of the petitioner, and
  - (b) take an affidavit that to the best of the person's knowledge the signatures witnessed are those of persons entitled to sign the petition.
- (3.1) The petition must have attached to it the affidavits referred to in subsection (3).
- (4) The petition must have attached to it a signed statement of a person stating that(a) the person is the representative of the petitioners, and

(b) the municipality or the Minister, as the case may be, may direct any inquiries about the petition to the representative.

#### Section 225(1)

A petition must be filed with the chief administrative officer and the chief administrative officer is responsible for determining if the petition is sufficient.

(2) No name may be added to or removed from a petition after it has been filed with the chief administrative officer.

(3) In counting the number of petitioners on a petition there must be excluded the name of a person

(a) whose signature is not witnessed,

(a.1) whose signature is witnessed but for which no affidavit is attached to the petition,

(b) whose signature appears on a page of the petition that does not have the same purpose statement that is contained on all the other pages of the petition,

(c) whose printed name is not included or is incorrect,

(d) whose street address or legal description of land is not included or is incorrect,

(e) if the date when the person signed the petition is not stated,

(f) when a petition is restricted to certain persons,

(i) who is not one of those persons, or

(ii) whose qualification as one of those persons is not, or is incorrectly, described or set out, or

(g) who signed the petition more than 60 days before the date on which the petition was filed with the chief administrative officer, unless

Referencing Section 223(1) of the Municipal Government Act, the minimum number of petitioners must be signed by electors equal in number to at least 10% of the population.

For further reference Section 226(1) of the Municipal Government Act states:

Within 45 days after the date on which a petition is filed, the chief administrative officer must make a declaration to the council or the Minister on whether the petition is sufficient or insufficient.

(2) Repealed 1995 c24 s26.

(3) If a petition is not sufficient, the council or the Minister is not required to take any notice of it.

In addition, Section 221.1 of the Municipal Government Act states:

If a council receives a sufficient petition requesting that council call a meeting with the public, the council must call a meeting with the public to discuss the matters stated in the petition and the meeting must be held no later than 30 days after the chief administrative officer declares the petition to be sufficient. In accordance with Section 226(1) of the Municipal Government Act; as the Chief Administrative Officer for the Town of Barrhead I declare that the submitted petition is insufficient.





#### 1.0 Purpose:

Request authorization to proceed with a specific 2024 expedited capital item for the Recreation Department.

#### 2.0 Background and Discussion:

The Aquatic Centre previously had heavy plastic curtains at the entrance of both change rooms. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the curtains were removed and never replaced due to some potential health issues.

As there is no current barrier at the entrance of the change rooms, the Recreation Department received numerous complaints last winter that the pool deck was cold. The Recreation Department feels the absence of a barrier allows the cold winter winds to move quickly from the main entrance to the change rooms and then onto the pool deck. The suggested solution is to install sliding doors in the hallway – leading to the change rooms to prevent the cold winds from moving further into the facility.

The budgetary cost for the sliding doors has been calculated at \$15,000.00.

Recently, Administration received an e-mail from B.A.R.C.C. formally requesting the waiving of the rental fee for the Town's Charles Godberson Rotary Room for the organization's 3-day special event.

The following is information found on B.A.R.C.C.'s web-site:

The Barrhead & Area Regional Crime Coalition is a regional partnership between the County of Barrhead, the Town of Barrhead, Woodlands County, the RCMP and Barrhead & District Rural Crime Watch Association to address crime.

The purpose of the coalition is to take a collaborative approach to make our communities safer. Through coordinated efforts in education and awareness of crime prevention and reporting suspicious activities, BARCC is taking an active role in reducing crime

In the recent pass, Council has denied similar requests but have provided the organization with a cash donation equivalent to the rental fee.

B.A.R.C.C. has received a crime prevention grant from the Province and the funds are ear-marked for registration subsidy and to facilitate and host five different workshops.

The 2023 Operating Budget includes a grant to B.A.R.C.C. in the amount of \$500.00 which has not been issued to date.

In accordance to Bylaw 06-2023, the following are the current rental rates (GST included) for the Charles Godberson Rotary Room:

#### **RE: Waiving Multi-Purpose Room Rental Fees**

BARCC is planning to host a 3-day certification course in Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED). The target audience for this course is curators of public & community spaces, including municipal staff, community hall operators, campground owners, and others. This CPTED certification course was previously organized by the Town of Barrhead and set to be held in 2022 but was postponed for various reasons. After BARCC's receipt of the Alberta Crime Prevention Grant last year, we are reviving this project. The course will take place over 3 days in October 2023.

The projects that are funded by BARCC's receipt of the Alberta Crime Prevention Grant are twofold. First, BARCC will subsidize registration in a CPTED certification course, as noted above. Second, BARCC will host a number of short crime prevention workshops throughout the Town of Barrhead, County of Barrhead, and Woodlands County. These short workshops will be focused on the general public, and are completely funded by the grant.

As noted, the only grant funding allocated to the CPTED course is for subsidized registration costs for attendees. For this reason, we are unable to use grant funding for facility rental for the 3-day CPTED certification course.

The Dr. Charles Godberson Multi-Purpose Room would be an ideal location and is well set up to hold this course, since one component of the training involves going on class site visits of public spaces in town. Since the Town is a primary partner in BARCC, we are requesting that the Town waive multi-purpose room rental fees for the CPTED certification course.

Waiving facility rental fees for CPTED certification would allow BARCC to deliver on our grant obligations, but more importantly it would support BARCC's mandate of taking an active role in reducing crime through crime prevention education. Support from the Town of Barrhead in this way would continue the long history of the Town's support for BARCC initiatives.



In 2022, the Barrhead & Community Victim Services Unit Association saw the largest growth in the unit's history, in terms of KD5151 referrals, client/victim numbers and overall workload. As the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions eased at the beginning of the year, our unit was fully engaged in order to keep up with the high demands for VSU supports and services for the victims of crime and trauma in this community. Overall, Barrhead Community Victim Services Unit saw a substantial increase in numbers for 2022, both in day-to-day activities and the number of active files.

In 2022 an announcement was finally made regarding the restructuring of the Victim Services delivery model for Alberta. You will recall that in 2020 the Government of Alberta passed *The Victims of Crime (Strengthening public Safety) Amendment Act,* which expanded the mandate of the Victim of Crime Fund to include public safety initiatives, thereby resulting in decreased funding available specifically for Victims Services units in the province. Additionally, at the time, there were discussions occurring at the provincial level regarding new Victims Services organization models.

In July, 2022 we were informed that the Government of Alberta was restructuring all VSU'S across the Province into their proposed 'Zonal Model', which ultimately will mean the closure of our unit in its current form in 2024. Although the announcement was not received well by most units, at least it provided a final plan and decision, as waiting for the new direction has caused a lot frustration and uncertainty for units, since it had been a two year time frame of not knowing what the changes would entail.

Barrhead and Community VSU had a good year with fundraising efforts, including a successful casino in January and volunteering at the Festival of Trees Event (which included a 50/50 draw). We did have a small hiccup with the Wildrose Rodeo fundraiser, all of which now have been corrected for future events. None of our fundraising would be possible with out our special volunteers, and the board members. Thank you everyone for the hard work and dedication.

Our Victim Services Unit continued to be the recipients of generous community groups(and individuals) gifting us with donations, both monetary and items such as the beautiful handmade quilts made locally and given to our unit to gift to our clients/victims. Thank you so very much!

Another success for our unit in 2022 was hiring a new staff member to assist the Program Manager in the office to help handle the higher workload due to the increased unit numbers.




#### <u>Files</u>

The total new files generated for Barrhead Community Victim services in 2022 were 585. This is 339 MORE files than last year and more than doubles our file/referral numbers from 2021- this is a remarkable increase! Additionally, our crisis call out numbers were increased, which aligns with the increased file numbers.

The return to regular office status, and loosening of pandemic related health restrictions meant less logistical challenges in assisting the RCMP. The majority of the files followed the same trend and consisted mostly of family/domestic violence related, assaults, sexual assaults, fraud, property crime, theft and MHA related files. Our small but mighty unit somehow kept up with the increased demand for our services, and continued to provide a plethora of victim support programming and services that were needed. Additionally, our unit's RCMP compliance rate was much higher than previous years, contributing to the increased numbers, as the referrals and files were properly entered and scored.



The following chart shows *where* the new files were generated in our communities (note: this chart does not show the number of VSU declined files or files reopened):



**Please note:** the Geographic Area is where the incident occurred. This is not a true picture of where the victims are living.

#### What we did

2022 saw us return to our normal VSU service delivery; we no longer needed to execute our duties in innovative ways to align with the provincial restrictions. This meant we could serve our clients in ways that were aligned with our unit's mission statement, bylaws, policies and procedures.

Regular VSU duties and responsibilities of the staff and volunteers included 24/7 crisis care, emotional support, court preparation, court updates and accompaniment. We also provided information regarding Victim Impact Statements, Financial Benefits (counselling coverage), Restitution forms and the Victim of Crime Protocols.

in addition to the organizational duties we have extensive reporting obligations to meet the requirements of the Ministry of Justice and the Solicitor General.

2022 marked our busiest year yet with our court program as it is still trying to handle the back logged justice system from the pandemic. Our unit attended several trials, crown meetings and court preps in Barrhead, St. Albert, Fort Saskatchewan, Court of Kings Bench in Edmonton and we travelled to Red Deer Kings Bench Court to assist a youth sexual assault victim.



Barrhead VSU has put in a tremendous amount of time and effort to foster partnerships in the communities we serve. These partnerships are a vital component for Victim Services as they create a more comprehensive and cohesive approach for our clients and in turn lessens the impact of crime on the victim. In 2022, we continued to send referrals to community partners, including, but not limited to: Barrhead Family and Community

Support Services (Foodbank, Advocacy and Support, Counselling), Alberta Health Services Mental Health and Addictions, Swan Hills Detox Centre, Sexual Assault Centre of Edmonton, Zebra Child Protection Centre, School Counselors, RCMP and School Resource Officers.

We also collaborated closely with the Probation Officers and the Crown Prosecutor's office to streamline and assist victims to navigate the judicial process. Fortunately, once the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions ended, and court resumed in-person, court dates were no longer being cancelled and rescheduled as often as the years prior. However, we did continue to see an increase of 'Withdrawn' and 'Stay of Proceeding' outcomes.

2022 meant VSU was able to leave ZOOM meetings in the past, and for the most part meet in person as we continued our strong working relationships with the many community agencies: Inter-Agency (Barrhead & Swan Hills), Barrhead Cares, Community Action for Healthy Relationships (CAHR) and the Barrhead Elder Abuse Community Advisory Group. We made it a priority to keep communication open with Barrhead Composite High School counselling staff in case VSU was needed to go into the school and do court preparation with students who may be victims and/or are being subpoenaed to court. Over the past couple of years this was a great way to help lessen the stress for young people going to testify in court. However, this year most students/youth preferred to meet with VSU at the detachment.

#### The People

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Barrhead Community Victim Services Unit Association would not be successful without our dedicated volunteers. Whether they volunteer as a Victim Services Advocate, Board Member, or a volunteer for special events, our people make this program run. In 2022, there were 9 members on the Board, 4 Victim Advocates and approximately 25 volunteers that helped in other capacities. These volunteers put in countless hours directly assisting victims of crime, being on call for crisis calls, attending court trials and docket days, administrative duties, Advocate meetings, Board Meetings, RCMP and PM meetings, public relations, training, attending special events and fundraising. A special heart felt 'Thank you' goes to all the volunteers. Each and every one of you is vital to the success of our unit.

#### Our RCMP Partners

Under the great leadership of Sgt. Bob Dodds (Barrhead) and Cpl. Fil Vicente (Barrhead) and Sgt. Devron Dittmer (Swan Hills), we forged ahead to further strengthen our partnerships and relationships with the our RCMP partners. Additionally, the vital support of Cst. Ben Tapp and Cst. David Serdobintsev, as our RCMP Liaison Members have played a pivotal role in our referral processes and ultimately, our ability to deliver services to our clients in the community. I am so thankful for all the support, assistance and dedication they gave to me and the unit. I extend sincerest gratitude to all the RCMP members and support staff in the detachments, as the atmosphere is very welcoming, caring and humorous. There is a true comradery that has been built-- Thank you again to all those in both detachments for your partnerships, assistance and encouragement, as these relationships are key to the success of this unit.

Sgt. Dodds will be retiring in the near future, and I know the atmosphere in the detachment will change. He has been a great leader, cheerleader and support, both to me and this unit, and will be deeply missed. I want to extend my personal thanks and gratitude-it's been a pleasure serving this community beside you—Betty-Lou

Our Board members show a strong commitment and high ethical standard of practice to VSU and the community. It's been an absolute pleasure to work along side them.

Thinking about moving forward in this work without the amazing board by my side is something I am still trying to process. You have all served your community with heart and dedication for so many years helping to lessen the impact that crime, trauma and tragedy have on victims. This program has so much to be proud of.

Although the future is uncertain, being able to continue this helping hands work, along side passionate advocates to ensure compassionate and knowledgeable assistance that our communities and clients deserve, will always be my goal. How to do this, is still up in the air, as we await further direction from the Government of Alberta.

As I close off this final annual report for Barrhead & Community Victim Services Unit Association, I want to say thank you. I will remember my time working with you all very fondly and with such gratitude to all those served before me and beside me throughout the years. There are truly no words to express the admiration I have for your dedication and commitment, or to recognize the impact it has on me, and to the community and the victims/clients we serve. This unit has supported some of the most vulnerable citizens at their most vulnerable times, but is only as strong as the people who make it up.

I'll conclude with this quote that resonates deeply about being passionate with reference to the work we do within Victim Services. 'Helping people at their most vulnerable time is hard, but it's a privilege.'

It's a privilege that I hope to be able to continue long into the future.
